# **Unit Money Earning Projects**

Recently it has come to our attention that there are some misconceptions out there about the Unit Money Earning Applications. The purpose of this form is to make sure that when a unit is conducting a money earning project they are conforming to Scouting's standards. This form is not used to tell the council how much money your unit has and just because your unit fills this form out it does not mean the council will be taking part of the proceeds from this project in fact we will not take any of them. The way in which a unit

earns money to carry out its program is of great importance in the education of youth members in basic values. All that this form does is allows us to know what your unit is doing and that you are doing it according to Scouting's standards. Any unit conducting a unit money earning project must fill out one of these Unit Money Earning Project Applications. applications can be obtained by going to the council service

#### Unit Money Earning Projects from page 1

center and picking them up or by asking your district executive

Here are some guidelines to follow in planning your unit's money earning project. Does your plan comply with local ordinances; is it free from any association with gambling; and is it consistent with the ideals and purposes of the Boy Scouts of America? Money earning projects that include the sale of raffle tickets are in violation of this policy, a raffle is a form of gambling. This question can be answered only in terms of specific proposals. If there is any question of its suitability, contact the council service center.

If a commercial product is being sold, will it be sold on its

own merits and without reference to the needs of Scouting, either directly (during the sales presentations) or indirectly? Teaching youth members to become self-reliant and to earn their own way is an important part of training our youth members. The official uniform is intended to be worn primarily for use in connection with Scouting activities. However, the council executive board of the local council may authorize wearing the uniform in connection with council-sponsored product sales program. A unit money earning project is not a Scouting activity, its a way that Scouts can earn the money to participate in Scouting activities. That is why when your unit is conducting a money earning project they are not to wear the official uniform. The Trail's End Popcorn Sale on the other hand is a council-sponsored product sales program which our executive board has approved.

If tickets are sold for any function other than a Scouting event, will they be sold by your youth members as individuals without depending on the goodwill of Scouting to make the sale possible? Tickets may be sold by youth members in uniform in the name of Scouting for such things as scout shows, pack or troop suppers, and similar Scouting events, but only for Scouting events. Tickets being sold for any other organization's function can not be sold in uniform, it must be done without depending on the name of Scouting to make the

Even when sales are confined to parents and friends, will they get their money's worth from any product they purchase, function they attend, or services they receive from your unit? Here again is the principle of value received - a sale standing on its own merit - so that the recipients are not in any way subsidizing either Scouting or the member. Youth members must learn to pay their own way and to honestly earn the money to do it. You cannot permit anyone to use the good name of Scouting to sell a product.

Remember, the unit money earning application is only used as a tool to assist your unit in providing a quality Scouting program to its youth members and to make sure that your unit programs remain within the standards of Scouting. So please, remember to fill out and turn them in at least two weeks before you plan on participating in a money earning

A new Pack was needed at the Boys' Club in Sarasota in 1989 so Terry organized Pack 38 and helped it for its first year, then went on to help reorganized Troop 14 as Scoutmaster at St. James Methodist Church, Sarasota.

Currently, Terry serves as a Miccosukee Unit Commissioner. During the years, he has been on the Cub Day Camp staff for five years, the Powwow staff for seven years, Scoutmaster Fundamentals staff, Webelos Training staff, Camp Flying Eagle Cook Corps since the beginning, campmaster corps, Summer camp handicraft director for six years at Camp Flying

Eagle, Cub Parent Overnighter staff for five years, Sunny Land Fun-O-Ree staff, Council Scout Show staff, and Cub Scout Roundtable staff for six years.

Wayne's service began as assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 9, Manatee United Methodist Church, moving up to Scoutmaster in 1961 where he served for four years. Troop 5 was formed as a new Troop at the same location in 1981. Wayne was asked to be their Scoutmaster for another four years. In between Scoutmaster assignments, he served on the District and Council Camping committees and still gives his remarkable dedication to these committees more than thirty years later. Since 1978, he has been a Properties Committee

member, then chairman. He was on the Sunny Land Council Executive Board and maintains an active membership on the Southwest Florida Board.

Wayne shared his "A Scout is Reverent" belief with the Manatee Methodist Church Sunday school program for six years. His activities in Scouting did not leave much time for the Manatee Masonic Lodge #31 where he worked up through Junior Warden. He was a DeMolay Advisor for three years. His District has honored him with the Award of Merit, and Live Oak Award: he earned the Scouters Key, Scouter's Training Award, was inducted into the Caloosa Lodge as a youth and is a Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow. He led an

expedition trek at Philmont in 1982. In 1993 and 1997, Wayne traveled to Virginia for the National Boy Scout Jamboree and lent a talented hand to the Physical Arrangements staff. He saw more of the Jamboree than many of the boys because he was needed everywhere there was water.

Bridges, showers, restrooms, cabins, the kitchen, the dining hall roof, sheds, paths, parking lots, electric circuits at Camp Flying Eagle have been built or rebuilt because of Wayne's prudence, capability and skillful use of materials and manpower. He's been one of major continuous influences on the improvements there. Thank you, Wayne.

Your will learn about identifying market opportunities, creating and evaluating business ideas, and exploring the feasibility of a business idea as you develop a basic business plan. You will also have the opportunity to see how everything fits together as your start and operate your own business

As you read the concepts, information, and activities in this manual, keep in mind that many Scouts who start a business to earn the Entrepreneurship merit badge will probably operate that business for only one to three months. Some of the areas covered-especially the financial areas-may appear a little complicated when you first read about them. However, you will find that these are really not difficult to handle (and, in fact, can be fun) when starting up and running a small business for a short time

Entrepreneurship is important for continued economic growth and community development. As entrepreneurs improve the quality of the lives of others and their communities, they improve the quality of their own lives. We hope you will enjoy your introduction to entrepreneurship and will come to understand and appreciate its potential for developing selfsufficiency and personal fulfillment. Requirements

- 1. In your own words, define entrepreneurship. Explain to your merit badge counselor the role of the entrepreneur in the economy of the United States.
- 2. Identify and interview an individual who has started his or her own business. Find out how the entrepreneur got the idea for the business and how the entrepreneur recognized it as a market opportunity. Find out how the entrepreneur raised the capital (money) to start the business. How well is the business doing? Report what you learn.
  - 3. Do the following:
    - a. Write down as many ideas as you can think of for a business. Get ideas from your family and friends. From your list, select three ideas that you believe are the best opportunities for you.
    - b. Explain to your counselor why you chose these three ideas rather than the others on your list.
    - c. For each of the three ideas that you chose, prepare a list of questions that you would ask potential customers. d. For each of your three ideas, informally interview potential customers, using the lists of questions from
    - requirement 3c. Report what you learn.
      e. Using the information you have gathered, choose the one idea that you feel is your best business opportunity.
- 4. Conduct a feasibility study of your business idea by doing all of the following (briefly writing or explaining each item to your counselor):
  - a. Good or Service

    - (1) Identify your business goals.(2) Tell how you will make the good or perform the service. Determine whether it is technically feasible (practical or doable).
    - (3) Determine how you can make enough of the good or provide enough of the service to meet your business goals. Explain how you will accomplish this.
    - (4) Identify and describe the potential liability risks of your good or service.

      Determine what type of license you might need
    - (5) in order to sell or to make your good or service.
  - (1) Determine who your customers are. Identify the
    - type of person who would buy your good or service. (2) Describe the unique benefits of your good or
    - (3) Tell how you will promote and sell your good or service to potential customers.
  - c. Finances
    - If you are selling a good, determine how much it will cost to make one prototype.
    - Calculate the selling price of your good or service. Explain how you determined the price. Tell how you will sell your good or service and
    - make a profit. (4) Determine how much money you will need to start your business. Explain how you will get the money.
  - - (1) Determine what parts of the business you will handle yourself. Describe your qualifications for the work. Determine how your business

- responsibilities will fit into your schedule.
- Determine whether you will need additional help to operate your business. If you will need help, describe the qualifications your helpers should have and what duties they will perform.
- 5. Do two of the following:
  - a. Sketch a prototype of your good or write a description of your service
  - b. Create the prototype. List all of the materials you used to make your prototype. Calculate the cost of all the materials and labor to compute the total cost of
- making your prototype.
- c. Design a promotional poster or flier for your good or service.
- d. Project (estimate) your sales through the first three months of operation. Calculate the profit you expect
- 6. When you believe that your business idea is feasible, start your business. Show evidence that you started your business (sales receipts, for example, or photos of the good). Report to your counselor the results of your venture.

# **Unique Boat For Sale**

A "Pirogue" flat-bottomed boat has been donated to the Council to sell. It is in excellent condition. It will be on display in the lobby of the Council Office. Following is a description of the boat:

This unique flat-bottomed boat was adopted from the Indians by Spanish and French explorers long before the white man settled in North America. Long, slim, low, and pointed at both ends, the Pirogue brought settlers, their equipment, goods, and other necessities to otherwise inaccessible parts of the country. Originally hewn from a single log, this versatile vessel has been used in bayous by outdoorsmen for decades.

This Pirogue, made by hand, is a replica of the southern Pirogue. The fourteen foot long craft weighs approximately seventy-five pounds. The sides are made from the finest

cypress available; the bottom is constructed of marine plywood for strength and durability. A removable wooden platform keeps your feet dry and allows for easy cleaning. If you or your unit is interested in purchasing the "Pirogue,"

In addition to the annual income (part of which is tax free, by the way:), you also receive an income tax charitable deduction the year you make the gift annuity. Your gift to the Council can be large or small, and the gift annuity is very simple to create.

What Exactly Is it All?
BlazerTrail: The BlazerTrail is a program for the first year camper. The Scouts will be using the patrol method of teaching, which is: explanation, demonstration, practice and review (it is the unit's responsibility to review the skills that the Scouts have learned).
