The meeting was held at 6:30 over a supper provided and served by the Palmetto Womans Club. Deputy Regional Scout Executive, from Macon, Ga; Scout Executive Carl Sullivan of South Florida Council; and Field Executive Truman A.Horlon at the request of Chairman W.T.Harrich presented the history of the work and showed the need for a new Council.

Without dissent it was moved and carried that a new Council, Boy Scouts of America, comprising the two counties of Sarasota and Manatee be formed.

On proceeding to the election of officers, C. E. Hitchings, Sarasota, was elected President of the Council, and took the chair.

Geo.T.Blakely, Pelmetto, was elected temporary secretary.

Vice Presidents elected were: - Judge W.T.Harrison, Palmetto.

Major H.P.Munck, Bradenton.

W.G.Sparkman, Manatee.

S.H. Fifield, Bradenton, was elected tressurer.

President C.E. Hitchings was elected National Council Representative.

Moved and carried that Truman A. Horton be engaged as Scout Executive.

After some discussion as to budget for the year it was moved and carried that a budget of \$7500.00 be set. This budget was apportioned as follows: Sarasota County, \$3500.00: Manatee County, \$4000.00.

Horton be paid a salary of \$250.00 per month.

The Council has been confronted with a problem that is worthy the best efforts of all members.

A thorough survey shows that there should be upwards of One usand Scouts registered, but the territory is eadly undertitutioned and consequently responsible loaders are scarce. Attental has been brought to this problem before, but perhaps has not been ressed enough. Concentrated efforts on the part of a well organized top Organization Committee should solve this difficulty and place us a position to prosecute a large scale scouting program.

One new Troop was formed in Sarasota County and the new Home rol idea furnished us by the Department of Rural Scouting of ional Council, is being tried in Osprey.

Ten Troops reregistered promptly, two of them 30 days ahead time and seven of them reregistering approximately 90% of their members.

It has been found necessary to drop Troops 3 and 6 until the msoring Institutions and Troop Committees of same can secure leaderto for them. The majority of this membership has been absorbed in er Troops.

I beg to submit my report on the Sixth Regional Camp Conference held in Atlanta during the week of April 15th:

These conferences are held annually in order that the men who handle the local council camps may have opportunity to prepare themselves as camp directors, water front men, activities and handicraft leaders.

Mr. Roberts, who accompanied me, registered for the regular handicraft course, while I registered for the camp director's training.

The camp staff this year was unusually good, the National Council sending some of its best me to conduct the various courses. Judson Freeman, head of the National Council Training School, was camp director. Commodore W. E. Longfellow, chief of the Red Cross Division of Life Saving, directed the course for waterfront men, while Fred C. Mills, National Council Director of Water Front Activities, had charge of the canoeing and boating. Camp Administration was handled by L. L. McDonald, head of the Division of Camping, and Gunnar H. Berg, of the Department of Education, put on a very fine course in boy psychology.

The camp was organized on the patrol basis, six units being formed and camping in standardized tents, including various types for sleeping quarters and large baker's tents for kitchens. Standardized cooking equipment was also used, and each patrol cooked the evening meal, washed their pots and pans and policed camp as Scouts should under similar circumstances.

Breakfast and dinner were served at the regular mess hall, and in accordance with menus prepared and recommended by the National Department of Camping, and which furnished an abundance of well cooked food for the campers.

The campsite, that of the Atlanta, Council, was a fine one, although rather hilly and with not sufficient level ground for games and ceremonies. The regular sleeping quarters were built to take care of two patrols, a plan not in accordance with the best

camping practice, which has demonstrated that the unit should be eight boys. The lake was an artificial body of water, but so muddy that it could be used only for boating, while a concrete swimming pool using filtered water was used for swimming purposes. Filtered water was used for drinking and was quite satisfactory.

The mess hall had a capacity of 150 Scouts and was raised above the ground so as to provide ample space underneath for the storage of boats and other material, and to furnish plenty of space for a handicraft lodge.

The kitchen was well equipped with range, bakers' oven, tables, sinks, racks., etc., and enamelled dishes were used in the mess hall.

While the camp was perfectly sanitary, some of the equipment was not up-to-date, pit latrines being used and the disposal of garbage not being handled in the most efficient manner.

The Atlanta Council, through its camp staff, made a very fine showing for the efficiency, courtesy and hospitality shown on this occasion.

The various courses covered rather thoroughly most of the points on which camp leaders should be informed. Particular stress was laid upon the proper psychology of boy training. It was strongly urged that discipline could be maintained not so much by authority of the camp director as by interesting the boys themselves in the matter of making good records. may say in passing that this was the plan used at the last camp I handled in the Okefinokee Council and it worked very efficiently. Emphasis was laid upon the matter of a camp program that would appeal to the Scouts themselves, tather than one that would strive after the highest possible records of camp direction and camp objectives. In other words, the camp director, while trying for a high rating for his camp, should not lose sight of the fact that camping in Scouting exists solely for the boys and should be made interesting to them, getting away from the old idea of a cut and dried program that could not be changed even when conditions demanded it.

The matter of camp records, health and sanitation, legal phases of Scouting, reading program and other topics were carefully handled and the latest ideas along these lines interestingly discussed.

In spite of the inclement weather for the first two or three days, the men from the various councils maintained a most commendable morale and a very fine spirit of fellowship prevailed throughout the entire week.

The last day of the conference was devoted to examinations on the various courses, as well as a rather severe intelligence test, which your representatives hope they passed with flying colors.

Moving pictures of various activities about the camp were made by a Paramount representative and should be released this week.

In conclusion, allow me to thank the board, both for Mr. Roberts and myself, for having made it possible to attend this conference.

Gentlemen: Mary Deputy Commissioner Hoberts and Brown

I submit herewith my report as Scout Executive for the month of April, 1929.

On April 14th the first quarterly church service for Scouts was held at the Manatee Methodist church. Reports from Deputy Commissioner Brown show that all of the units were represented. In addition to the attendance of Scouts and officials a large number of interested visitors were present. The following figures are given by Mr. Brown:

Scouts present 81

In uniform 36

Officials present 9

Troop Committeemen 14

Total 141

Quite a number of the members of council were present in addition to those named above, but I have no report as to the exact number.

Analyzing these figures, I would say that the general attendance was very gratifying. The percentage of Scouts wearing uniforms was rather low and it will be our endeavor to improve the appearance of the units at the next gathering of this kind by inducing more of the Scouts to appear properly equipped. The number of troop officials attending was fair. The troop committeemen showed more interest than could have been expected but still scored a rather low per cent. I understand that some of the officials thought the service rather too long for the Scouts, and at future meetings we must gaurd against this, as nothing will kill the interest of the boys like unduly protracted sermons. Altogether, I believe that this first event of the kind was much more of a success than could have been hoped for.

The Scouts have taken advantage of the loan plan for securing uniforms. The amount lent were \$5.15 and \$3.45 and the payments have been promptly met so far.

Our system of inspection , instituted in April has worked very well. The examinations for that month were intended as instruction in what will be required in the future, rather than as a contest between the troops. However, some of the troops made very creditable showings and during May, when the contests start, the ratings will be much higher. Deputy Commissioner Roberts and Brown have been handling the inspections in their districts in a very satisfactory manner. The weak spots, as shown by these inspections are: Failure to wear uniform, lack of troop and patrop insignia, lack of patrol flags and totems. Attendence has been good, and discipline excelent in most cases.

There has been a slight discrepancy in our registration records, the perpetual inventory book showing 3 more Scouts than could be found on the individual record cards. I have accepted the card record as being correct. At the end of April the following figures are shown.

This shows that our membership is divided about as followes: Tenderfoot, 80%; second class 12% and first class or higher 8%. The national average is approximately: Tenderfoot 55%, second class 25%, first class and higher 15%. It will be seen that in order to attain the national average we must cut down the number of tenderfoots very materially and correspondingly increase the percentage of the other two classes. I believe that the interest now being shown by the Scouts in the Court of Honor indicates that we are making a good start in that direction.

I give herewith a brief summery of the general condition of the troops, as I find them after visiting each one, with the exception of six. which has been meeting Thursday evenings until recently, and which held no meeting on the date on which I visited them.

- 1. This is the largest troop in the council and is now carrying more Scouts than authorized for a full troop. Some have been placed on the inactive list, giving them approximately a full troop. Attendance good, Interest high. Regular visits from at least one troop committeeman. Altogether too many tenderfoot scouts. Just beginning to come out to Court of Honor meetings and pass tests. Scoutmaster active. New assistant just signed up. Pelieve in hiking.
- 2. Attendance very good. Only a few passing tests. No help from troop committee. Interest good, but program needs more Scout stuff. High percentage of tenderfoots. Needs assistant Scoutmaster. Scoutmaster on the job regularly but needs training.
- 3. Good attendance, fair interest. Just waking up to Court of Honor meetings. All tenderfoots with exception os Senior Patrol Leader. Scoutmaster inexperienced, but wishes to improve by training. Assistant Scoutmaster needed Senior Patrol Leader doing most of the work. Good discipline. Good Troop Committee.
- 4. A small troop, but a live one. Have been doing very good work, including hiking in their program. Fair amount of advancement, Scoutmaster regular in attendance, but is leaving town soon. Discipline good. Troop committee waking up.
- 5. High per cent of tenderfoots, but beginning to wake up to advancement opportunities. Scoutmaster definitely on the job and holding the scouts to a strict discipline. Not much assistance from troop committee. Too much athlectics in troop program. Needs assistant Scoutmaster. Membership increasing, 7 new members being signed up last month.
- 6. Have been unable to visit this troop. Scoutmaster is leaving. Has been at odds with his committee. All scouts are tenderfoots and only one has appeared before the court of honor during the last month. Have held conference with chairman of troop committee and am looking for a new leader. At present troop is thoroughly disorganized.

7. This troop has been without a Scoutmaster for several months but has been held together by the assistants. Discipline has been very poor. Troop committee active and trying hard to get new leader. Boys have been appearing for tests, and the troop has finally been re-registered, having been lapsed since February. Now trying to get new leader, whose meeting last week showed that he could do a great deal with this crowd of boys. Believe this troop will make a good record in the future.

- 8. This troop was lapsed for some time but hasbeen re-registered. Was formerly composed of older boys who have nearly all dropped out. New material coming in. New troop committee just organized. Scoutmaster active. One of the old members just commissioned assistant/ With the leadership opportunities furnished by the older scouts in this troop it should make a fine record.
- 9. Undoubted one of the best all-round units in the council. Membership does not show such a high percent of tenderfoots. Scoutmaster on the job. Discipline excellent. Has good junior staff. Attendance always good. Programs fair. Only one of the troops with anything like a real patrol organization. Need assistant.
- 10. Scoutmaster new to his job but anxious to learn. Receives good assistance from his troop committee. Active assistant. Good attendance. Fair programs, but too much indoor stuff. Showing much interest in advancement.
- ll. Probably the most enthusiastic unit in the council. Have a record at court of honor that has only been beaten once in five weeks. Scoutmaster efficient. Good programs. Outdoor activities. Attendance fine. Discipline good. Patrol organization can be improved. Need assistant Scoutmaster.

In most of our troops the patrol organization has been neglected. Patrols exist mearly on paper. This condition is one of the first that should be corrected, as the troop is not the efficient unit, but the patrol or gang. It will be my endeavor to have efficient patrol organizations in all of the troops just as rapidly as possible.

Registrations of the new scouts during the month total 24. However, owing to the fact that two lapsed troops in re-registering dropped a large number of scouts, amounting in all to 31, we showed a net loss of 7. Quite a number of these dropped scouts will probably be re-registered during this month.

To the Executive Board, Sunny Land Council:

Herewith I submit my report for the month of May.

I note an improvement in the condition of some of our troops, though some, owing to lack of leader-ship have made little progress as yet. Generally, I believe, the interest of the Scouts individually is much higher that it was a month ago, but in the development of troop and patrol morale, we still have far to go. The following paragraphs will give a general idea of the condition of the troops at this date.

Troop 1. This troop is hampered by having to carry on its roll a large number of inactive Scouts. However, its re-registration is due this month and a great deal of dead wood will be removed. While this dropping of inactive scouts will again hold down our membership record for June, it will, I believe, be of great value to this particular troop, which at present is marking time. I have received no objective sheet from this troop, nor have they sent in any weekly reports. They do not contribute to the weekly Scout department.

Troop 2. This troop is in charge of an acting assistant Scoutmaster, the Scoutmaster having been obliged to give up temporarily. No objective sheet has been received, no reports sent in. Since the acting assistant has taken charge, a weekly troop story has been published.

Troop 3. Mr. Seidenberg, scoutmaster of this troop, has moved away. They have an interested troop committee of five members, with a regular attendance of three or more at every troop meeting. Senior Patrol Leader Warren Saunders is handling the troop as effectively as it is possible for a boy deader, but the strong hand of a man is needed. The committee is now investigating a prospective scoutmaster. Objective sheets have been promised for this week. Some reports have been received and a troop story published during the last week in May.

Troop 4. Under the leadership of the new socutmaster, George T. Blakely, this troop is developing rapidly. Objectives have not been received, but weekly reports and troop stories have come in regularly. Their membership has increased from 7 to 13, and some old Scouts have been re-registered, one of whom will probably be appointed junior assistant.

Troop 5. Reported that the scoutmaster is resigning shortly. No objectives, no weekly stories and no reports. Meetings are good so far as attendance goes.

Troop 6. Have been unable to line up new scoutmaster for this outfit, and they are rather badly
disorganized. Have asked Troop 4 to take them under
their wing until new leader is secured, Have tried to
hold two conferences with troop committee, but no one
showed up except the chairman. If this bunch will
meet with Troop 4, I hope that they will absorb a
little discipline, which they need very badly.

Troop 7. Since re-organizing, this troop is making very fine progress. Mr. Pardee, the new Scoutmaster is very efficient, and is putting on a real Scouting program. They have re-registered a number of the Scouts dropped last month. Two new members of the troop committee have been signed up, additional assistants secured, a junior assistant appointed, making this troop therfirst to reach the council's organization standard. Objectives received. Some reports and stories.

Troop 8. Dr. Chaires, scoutmaster of this troop has just handed in his resignation, and as yet the troop committee has not been able to locate his successor. They have done very little during the past month. No objectives, no reports, one story.

Troop 9. This troop is keeping up its good work, and has a new assistant in prospect. Their reports come in regularly, they have definite objectives and their publicity stuff is fair. They are working up to the troop standard requirements, two new committeemen having been secured.

Troop 10. When I met with this troop last, no leaders were present, and I could form no idea as to their progress. However, they have accepted no objectives, sent in no reports and published no troop stories. They have been fairly interested in advancement, however, usually having a good delegation at Court of Honor meetings.

During the month of May we launched our Civic Service program. The first project undertaken was that of publicity for Dulcy, the play put on by the Rotarians for the benefit of the camp building program. This first project was by no means a success, as only a very few Scouts took part. In Bradenton only one troop participated and five scouts did all of the work. Civic service is one of the fundamentals of the Scouting program, and in order to do effective work along that line there must be complete cooperation between the Scouts, the leaders and headquarters. In this first civic work undertaken by the council, I believe our weak spot was the attitude of the leaders, this being in most cases a disposition to read to the troops headquarters announcement and let it go at that. We are now planning for the anti-mosquioto campaign next month, and from indications now visible, I believe the leaders will be much more interested. Record cards have been issued to the Scouts and they are beginning to take pride in filling them out.

to wear the proper insignia are some of the things we have to contend with. Also the practice of wearing the unofficial over-seas cap consitutes a very serious breach of the regulations. Any pictures of Sunny Land Council Scouts, no matter how interesting the subject, would never be used in any official Scout publication on account of this. I am aware that the council allowed the Scouts to use this cap, because it saved them considerable on the purchase of their uniform, but I think that we should gradually discourage its use. Copies of uniform regulations have been mailed to each troop leader, and his attention called to the requirements.

On May 30th, 39 Scouts and 3 officials turned out to take part in the American Legion's Memorial Day parade. While this number was not large as it should have been, your executive was very much gratified by the fine appearance, perfect discipline and good marching order of this contingent.

During the month, Mr. Paul Vetter gave to the council a number of tents with boarded up sides, for use at camp. While the tents themselves were of little value, the lumber can be used to advantage.

During the month of May all of the troops received a formal inspection with the exception of Troop 6. Most of these inspections were conducted by Deputy Commissioner Roberts, Deputy Commissioner Brown having been relieved from active duty until July 1. REPORT OF CAMP DIRECTOR

CAMP FLYING EAGLE, 1929

Troop 11 Bonn Augustl, 1929.

To the Executive Board, Sunny Land Council, BSA.

I submit herewith my report on the Summer Camping Period for 1929.

Owing to the fact that a sufficient supply of water could not be obtained until just before camp opened, our preparations were rather hurried. The water supply was examined and received the approval of the state Board of Health the day before we moved into camp. Mr. A. G. Renney, district officer of the State Board of Health, examined the site before the opening date and twice during the camping period. He obtained a second specimen of water for examination the second week of camp, and after the close of the camping period the State Board advised that gas forming organisms appeared to be present and asked for another sample.

The weather during the camping period was ideal. Sufficient rain fell to keep the air cool and comfortable, but not enough to interfere with the program, except on the date scheduled for overnight hikes, when a heavy shower prevented the campers from sleeping in the open. The hike program was, however, carried out.

The spirit of the campers was everything that could be desired. The discipline was excellent and a fine spirit of fellowship and sportmanship prevailed. The Scouts themselves adopted traditions for the government of the camp and lived up to them in a highly gratifying manner.

Numbers of visitors came to the camp during the two weeks period and appeared to be highly gratified with the program, the camp environment and the conduct of the Scouts.

If we deduct from this \$1.00 additional fee for each boy, which was the figure on which we based our first cost estimate, it will show that camp operations came

within \$16.00 of the amount estimated, when we orginally decided to charge a \$7.00 fee.

In preparing for camp we found it necessary to go to considerable additional expense. I submit herewith a list of expenditures incurred this way. I may say that I tried to hold these items down as much as possible, but in the establishment of an altogether new camp there were many expenses which I could not avoid.

RECOGNITION

I wish to pay particular tribute to the efficiency of the staff who assisted me during the camping period. I have never worked with a more congenial set of men and boys. They were thoroughly imbued with the spirit of Scouting and worked hard to put across the camp program. It is to their loyal efforts and to the hearty cooperation of the Scouts, the splendid spirit of helpfulness manifested by the Executive Board and camp committee, and the ungrudging assistance of the various civic organizations, that I attribute the fine record achieved at Camp Flying Eagle this year.

CAMP FIRE PROGRAMS

While each member of the staff assited in handling these nightly performances, Scoutmaster Geo. T. Blakely specialized in this line during the first week of the camp and Scoutmaster Edward Teim of Wauchula during the second week. I cannot praise too highly the very efficient work of these leaders.

HANDICRAFT

Deputy Commissioner L. D. Roberts handled the craftwork period each afternoon in a highly satisfactory manner. Much interest was shown by the Scouts and almost everyone had some article of craftwork to his credit before camp was over.

WATERFRONT

Assistant Scoutmaster Milliard B. White had charge of this department and was assisted for three days by Assistant Scoutmaster Henry Curry. The precautions taken to guard against water accidents were elaborate and in only three minor instances were the waterfront rules violated by the campers. Two of the Scouts, Leslie Roberts and John Coverstone, who have qualified as Scout Life Guards, assisted in the work of this department and I have only

the highest praise for all connected with this part of the camp work, particularly as this year it was rather difficult on account of the lack of equipment.

My thanks are also due Dr. R. G. Manchester, who visted the camp on three occasions to give the Scouts an opportunity to pass the Red Cross Life Saving tests.

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

Scoutmaster S. F. Williams, as cook and quartermaster, had about the most difficult job in camp, but he
performed his duties so well as to take a very heavy load
off the shoulders of the camp director. Under his able
direction, the mess hall and kitchen were kept in fine shape,
food in ample quantity was well cooked and meals served on
time, all of which things are most important factors in the
success of a camp, particularly from the standpoint of the
campers.

CAMP PAPER

Four issues of the Flying Eagle appeared during the camp period under the direction of Assistant Scoutmaster Wyatt Sewell, furnishing a most interesting contribution to camp life. The paper was printed on the council mimeograph and distributed to the Scouts and visitors.

ROPE SPINNING

Bill Carlton of the Wauchula outfit gave the boys instruction in rope spinning and rendered valuable assistance as officer of the day on several occasions.

TARGET PRACTICE

Deputy Commissioner Chester T. Brown, range officer of the council, visited camp and gave instruction and tests for the marksmanship merit badge. His services along this line wre of great value to the camp.

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS

The work of examining each Scout and Scouter twice a week was a task of considerable magnitude and the thanks of the camp director are due to the four physicians who gave so generously of their time to make these examinations and to inspect the sanitary condition of the camp twice each week. Drs. Blake, Davis, McDuffie and Gates handled this part of the camp work in a most efficient manner.

Herewith I hand you my report for the month of September.

CAMPING -- Troop 2 was the only unit using Camp Flying Eagle during the month. This troop, under the supervision of Committeeman H. C. Fleming, spent two night in camp early in the month.

SCOUT LEADERS -- Owing to the sessions of the Training School, no meeting of the Scout Leaders' Association was held during the month.

TRAINING SCHOOL--The training school reached its fifth session this week. The attendance for the last two meetings has dropped considerably, but those who are still continuing the course are displaying much interest. Three of the students have been assigned to temporary work with the troops, Frank Pelot with Troop 9, and B. L. Hudgins and Gautier Jackson with Troop 5.

GENERAL CONDITIONS -- A survey of the troops of the council show that all are functioning, with the exception of 8 and 10. A complete reorganization of these units is necessary. The follwing paragraphs will give an idea of the situation of the other troops.

Troop 1.--During the last month this troop has showed signed a revival of interest. New junior officers, scribe, reported and senior patrol leader, have been appointed. Troop reports and stories are being turned in regularly. Headquarters has been moved from the church to a nearby building. Troop committee 2/3 dead. Scoutmaster and assistant taking much more interest. Not enough interest in advancement.

Troop 2.--This unit is making fine progress along all lines of Scouting. The chairman of the Troop committee is acting as Scoutmaster, and the rest of the committeemen are active. A gratifying feature of the work is the number of dropped scouts who are being re-registered. Advancement is stressed. Regular monthly hikes are part of the program.

Troop 3.--While this troop has been without a Scoutmaster for some months, it has progressed well under the leadership of Jr. Asst. Scoutmaster Warren Saunders. Efforts have been made to line up an adult leader, but without success. During Saunders absence at the Jamboree, the troop was not active, but since his return is showing considerable pep. A new meeting place has been secured and Scouts who have been inactive are returning. Troop committee is active. Regular reports, and troop stories.

Troop 4.--One of the very best units in the council. Scoutmaster and assistant are both attending leaders training course. Scouts are active in every event suggested by council. Troop committee largely inactive. Troop re-registers this month and new committee members may be secured. Great interest in advancement. Troop stories and reports in every week immediately after meeting.

Troop 5.--This troop have been inactive for the last six weeks, but temporary leaders from the training school have been supplied. Troop committee interested but not particularly active. Held one meeting with Scout Executive and Commissioner last month in an effort to line up leader without success. Temporary leaders are from Bradenton. No reports or stories.

of Sixth Region Executives held at Savannah, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Leaving Bradenton early Sunday morning, in company with H. O. Kight of Royal Ralm Council, Fort Myers, and Russell Woodfin of Sarasota Council, we picked up C. M. Wakelin of Central Florida Council at Wildwood, spent the night at runswick and reached Savannah Monday morning in time for the opening session.

Only five of the Region Six executives were absent from the conference. Mr. Chadwick and Mr. Sharp of the Regional office were in attendance, as were Ray Wyland, George Ehler, Arthur Schuck, Sandifer, Keene, Frank Robinson and Chas. N. Miller of the National office. The sessions were held at Hotel De Soto.

The program was a very fine one, full of inspiration and practical as well. The National Council men who were present had very helpful messages to deliver and the Sixth Regional executives who participated made very fine presentations of their subjects. A noticeable spirit of fellowship prevailed among these men who had gathered to consider the problems of scouting, and the closing session witnessed a spontaneous recommitment of the executives to the spirit of cooperation with the regional office and a tribute to our Regional Executive, Francis D. Chadwick,

Subjects considered the first day grouped around the Scout Executive personally, Chas. N. Miller speaking on Scouting as a profession; Herbert Stuckey analysting the Scout Executive's task, and Millard Davidson presenting a fine paper off Ethics for Scout Executives. The consensus of these subjects showed clearly that those men who have gone into Scouting professionally and who expect to succeed therein must tie themselves up closely with the religious, civic and business life educational of their communities; that they should develop leadership to the highest possible degree; that they must study to improve themselves along all the various lines making for greater efficiency, and develop a code of ethics and practice it to the point where their communities will respect them, not only for the work they are doing but for their personalities as well.

Various topics were handled by Mr. Ray
O. Wyland, head of the department of Education. Mr. Wyland
is one of the outstanding men on the National staff. His
lectures on National Education and the Scouting Gamex
were inspirational to a high degree, as was that of Mr.
Miller on Education and Growth through Publicity.

Two papers presented that were of particular interest to your Executive were those of Weaver M. Marr of Jacksonville on the Executive Board of the Local Council, and The Troop Committee by Bunn Hackmey of High Point, N. C. Mr. Marr might have been describing the working of the Executive Board of Sunny Land Council, while Mr. Hackney suggested almost the identical plans under which we are trying to organize our own troop committees.

Mr. George W. Ehler handled the matter of Council Records Analysis and the Council Rating Plan. Mr. Ehler is generally looked upon as spending his time inthinking up new records and charts with which to worry the Scout Executive in the liesure time which he possesses so abundantly. His ideas, however, have proved to be so efficient, particularly in keeping the executive posted as to the growth or lack of growth of his council, that I consider his suggestions as of very great value in helping any council in matters that are usually guessed at and often guessed wrong.

The subject of Area Administration and Development, handled by Ar. Miller, contain much that will be of help to us in taking over the new territory recently assigned us.

Leo M. Sandefur spoke in a most practical way on the Budget System which he has developed. His idea that the law of Thrift, taught in apurely idealistic way in Scouting, can be applied in most practical manner in every troop through the adoption of the system. His suggestion that Thrift has four phases, Earn, Spend Wisely, Share and Save was particularly good. In his budget system, he works out the following items:

Dues of 5c per week, to be actually earned by the Scout, netting approximately \$2.50 per year. Of this amount, he considers that spending wisely will take care of these items:

Reregistration .50
Boy's Life 1.00
Tenderfoot, second class and
first class badges.30

Sharing accounts for 25c more and makes the troop responsible for such Good Turns as Christmas baskets. Savingtakes another 25c into the Troop sinking fund to be used for emergency and 20c is used for incidental expenses. He also suggested that Troop Committees build up a small revolving fund, that can be used in helping the Scouts purchase uniforms, go to camp, etc.

Mr. Keane, head of the department of Sea Scouting gave some very practical plans for organizing in this work and stated that plans were being worked out for a SeaScout Training Course for the executives of this region.

Altogether, I consider this conference, both for inspiration and for methods of applying perspiration as one of the most helpful I have ever attended, and I desire to express my thanks to the Board for having made it possible for me to attend.

December 1, 1929. To the Annual Meeting of Sunny Land Council, Boy Scouts of America.

Gentlemen: Herewith I submit my report as Scout Executive on the work of the council to date. I assumed my duties on March 15th of this year and immediately made a rather careful study of the situation facing me. As a result of that survey I was convinced: 1. That our losses in dropped Scouts was altogether too large. 2. That in order to cut down such losses and to enable the troops to function more efficiently it would be necessary to train leadership that could develop and put on programs that would hold the interest and attention of the boys in the various troops. 3. That there was not sufficient cooperation between the troops and council headquarters, particularly in the matter of council-wide activities. 4. That the recent purchase of a new campsite offered a wonderful opportunity for the development of Scouting in this council. 5. That it would be necessary to stimulate a spirit of emulation among the individual Scouts, particularly in merit badge work, in order to attain a proper standing in regard to the number of tests passed. 6. That the Executive Board and Court of Honor of the Council were so well organizied and functioning so efficiently, that these bodies, usually the despair of the Scout Executive, would need no attention from me and that I could devote most of my time to the conditions named above. These conditions were brought to the attention of the Executive Board and plans devised for correcting unfavorable conditions and for further stimulating those that were favorable. For correcting the loss in dropped Scouts, your Executive was directed to put on assoon as possible

a training school, authorized by the National Council, in order that the leaders of the various troops might have opportunity of fitting themselves for more efficient work. This evening ll certificates are awarded men who have completed this course. Twelve sessions have held in the fall course, and it is planned to conduct two courses each year, one in the spring for new men, and one in the Fall for advanced pupils. These schools are not only of much service to leaders already in Scouting, but they provide a waiting list of men who are willing to take on Scout work, who already have the training necessary and will not have to acquire it through the not any too easy method of handling a troop.

Field meets and pow-wows were the only troop events provided by the council program early in the year. To these have been added the quarterly church services, monthly inspections and a number of contests on efficiency, roundup of members, civic service, etc., which have stimulated a friendly spirit of competition among the troops. Lack of cooperation between troops and headquarters in the matter of reports and participation in the various events is being gradually overcome and most of the troops are developing a spirit that reaches out beyond their own ranks and makes for a council consciousness.

The opportunity provided by the purchase of a new campsite was not allowed to pass unheeded. The summer camping period of two weeks was largely attended and a comprehensive program of Scout activities furnished ample opportunity for training and advancement. The camping committee's report will go into detail as to the summer camp. A winter period of six days during the Christmast holidays is being planned.

Probably no branch of our work has shown more satisfactory results than that handled by the Court of Honor. From a few merit badge tests each month early in the year, the number had increased in October to 98. The report of the chairman of the Court of Honor will give further information as to the work of the court.

On January 1, 1929, the council records showed a membership of 185 scouts. During the year the following increases were noted:

However, to these figures must be added 56 Scouts in the new territory of Highlands and Hardee counties, which gives us a total membership at the present time of 236. About 20 more are included in the troop at Avon Park, which is lapsed at the present time, but is being re-organized.

We have on our records three troops that are lapsed, or behind in re-registration, Troops 5 and 6 of Palmetto and 10 of Ellenton. Two of these troops have been without leaders for some months, which accounts for their condition. All other troops are in good dtanding with the council.

In September, at the request of the Regional Office, we took over supervision of the counties of Highlands and Hardee. At the present time only limited service is being given these communities, largely through our bulletin service; but a visit to troops in this territory indicates that soon they can be induced to accept quotas toward the annual budget that will entitle them to more efficient service. There were five troops in these two counties. One, however, was defunct, and the one at Avon Park, as mentioned above, lapsed. The troops at Lake Placid, Sebring and Wauchula are doing very fine work in Scouting and I consider them as credits to Sunny Land Council.

During the year we have made earnest efforts to impress upon our Scouts that they are citizens of their various communities and that as such they should accept definite responsibility for public service. Your committee on Civic Service will report some of the activities along this line.

I would recommend for our Objective next year the following:

A 50% increase in Scouts.

A 50% increase in first class Scouts.

A fifty per cent increase in second class Scouts.

A 50% increase in Merit Badge tests.

A 25% increase in troops.

A Spring Training School for new leaders.

A Fall Training School for advanced leaders.

A Red Cross First Aid Course for leaders.

Spring and Fall Field Meets

Spring and Fall Roundups.

An Inter-Troop First Aid Contest.

Anniversary Week celebration.

No lapsed or suspended troops at end of year.

All troop committees functioning in an efficient manner.

I would strongly recommend that as soon as possible in 1930 steps be taken toward the organization of a Sea Scout Ship. Experience in many other councils has shown that this branch of Scouting is necessary if we are to hold the older boys. We have a wonderful opportunity here in Manatee county, where the combination of river, bay and Gulf furnishes unparalleled conditions. I have already been endeavoring to line up Sea Scout leadership, and believe we can start on the preliminary training of land patrols very soon.

Our new campsite at Flying Eagle I believe to be one of the very best in Region Six. We made a most promising start last summer in the matter of permanent improvements. The fine mess hall provided by the Bradenton Rotary Club, the sleeping quarters built by the Bradenton Elks and the Bradenton and Palmetto Kiwanians, the flowing well provided by the council, have given us a firm foundation on which to build from year to year. I hope that before the next summer samping season rolls around we may be able to install flush toilets, additional sleeping cabins and sufficient boats and canoes.

This has been for me a year of most pleasant effort While there have been heavy tasks to perform, the attitude of your Executive Board has been such that much of the load has been shifted from my shoulders to the various committees. There has been at all times a spirit of hearty and cheerful cooperation, not only manifested by those directly interested in Scouting, but by the public generally.

In closing this report, I wish to pay a special tribute to the volunteer leaders of Sunny Land Council, the Scoutmasters, Assistants and Troop Committeemen whose efforts have have contributed so largely to whatever of success we may have had in carrying out our program. They are the key men in Scouting; the council, with its various departments and committees, exists only to be of service to them. I hope we have helped them in their tasks this year and I wish to commend

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF COURT OF HONOR

Mr. President and Gentlemen:

I will make my report brief for we are workers and not talkers. To convince you of this fact, I extend you a very cordial invitation to visit us while at work each Tuesday in the year at Scout heasquarters; then you will understand what we are doing for the boys of Manatee County.

I have a body of the very highest type of men associated with me and will introduce them to you at this time. These men give much study and thought to the scout work, and from three to five hours weekly in Examinations.

We lay much stress on the Scout Oath and Laws, and if you as men and fathers of boys will learn the oath and laws I am sure you will profit much by so doing.

To become a Second Class Scout a boy must pass twelve tests. To become a First Class Scout he must pass twelve more tests. He has to pass five merit badges to become a Star Scout; ten merit badges to become a Life Scout, and twenty-one to become an Eagle Scout.

We have advanced scouts as follows: 22 to second class, 9 to first class, 12 to star, 2 to life, and 3 to Eagle. This means that we have passed over 1200 tests during the year.

The Scout Executive read the annual report and application for charter which was approved.

The Scout Executive was directed to take up with Harold Johnson the matter of auditing the accounts of the council.

Chas. N. Wilson was elected as Scout Executive for the ensuing year, at a salary of \$2400.00.

The Executive reported that the Rotary Club had agreed to furnish material for three boats to be built by the manual training department of the Manatee junior high school. Mr. S. E. Simmons presented to the council a boat for the use of Camp Flying Eagle.

L. F. Vaught for the committee on Educational Publicity reported that the Bradenton Herald had agreed to publish a tabloid supplement during Anniversay Week as a special Scout edition.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned after the rule adopted April 28, 1928, was read: "Any member of the Executive Board who misses three or meetings without reasonable and acceptable excuse will be automatically suspended."
