The regular monthly meeting of the Executive Board of Sunny Land Council was held this date at the Sarasota county courthouse, the following members being present: Paul W. Bergmann, first vice-president in the chair; George B. Gallup, W. D. Griffin, J. E. Cunningham, C. C. Montague, Geo. L. King, Chas. N. Wilson, Scout Executive. District Commissioner Frank Redd, r., was a visitor.

Minutes of the meeting of May 7th were read and approved.

Exuses were granted as follows: D. L. Thorpe, absence from council territory; Geo. T. Blakely, off on vacation; Fred H. Gould, sickness in family.

Under head of unfinished business, there being no report from the committee on camp title, additional time was granted.

Geo. B. Gallup read letters to and from Inslee estate in reference to forestry projecti, showing that progress was being made.

Wew business was taken up and the Scout Executive asking for authority to penalize troops failing to send in reports the board voted that any unit failing to file its reports for any definite month by the 5th of the succeeding month will not be allowed to send its members before the Court of Honor for advancement for a period of thirty days.

Thorpe, Bergmann and Wilson were appointed a Steering Committee for the Regional Camporee, with authority to appoint such sub-committees as may be needed.

It was voted to hold a short-term camp at Camp Gumperts, opening at noon, Thursday, Sept. 13, to which the public will be invited. The following were appointed to arrange for same: Wilson, program; Cunningham, stunts; Montague, health and safety; Gallup, King, transfortation for troops from Manatee district.

On motion of George B. Gallup, it was duly seconded and carried that hereafter district committee meetings be held on call only, and that all district committee members be invited to the monthly meetings of the Executive Board.

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The emmittee on Publicity and Propaganda was directed to arrange for speakers before the Parent-Teachers' Associations and other civic organizations whenever possible in order that the aims and objectives of Scouting may received due publicity.

The Scout Executive announcing the first of a series of awarding courts for the Sarasota district, it was voted to hold the meeting at the Edwards theatre if arrangements could be made, Paul W. Bergmann agreeing to contact the theatre management.

No member of the camping committee was present to report, but the Scout Executive read the annual report on the summer camping season, which is filed herewith.

W. D. Griffin for the Groop Organization Committee reported that with the opening of the fall school term it was certain that a troop at Miakki City would be organized, two old scouts having been named on the faculty of the school, and who would serve as leaders. The Venice Chamber of Commerce will consider at its next meeting the matter of sponsoring a troop. Preliminary work has begun at Englewood. Bay Haven Baptist Church has appointed a committee to organize a troop there. At Oneco Warren Saunders is about ready to take up work of organizing.

There was no report from the committees on Publicity, Cubbing or Training.

It will be noted that while the hour objective set by thebtroops has already been passed, this is due to the efforts of Troops 5 and 9, which have greatly exceeded their marks, and that most of the troops are a long way yet from their objectives. A few troops have turned in no reports of community service. The Civic service committee was directed to get in touch with the lagging troops.

Dr. C. C. Montague of the Committee on Health and Safety reported a general cleanup at Camp Gumpertz pre; iminary to the Kiwanis Health Camp. A new sanitary latrine and washhouse has been installed and repairs to the dock made. It is hoped later to install a new watertank and pressure system. The cooperation of the Kiwanis Glub, City of Sarasota and FERA made possible the improvements.

The Committee on Civic Relationships was not represented at the meeting but the Scout Executive read its report:

The Kiwanis Club of Bradenton secured FERA labor to tear down and move the Camp Flying Eagle the old Scout head-quarters building. Out of the lumber was built a camp headquarters building and a first aid station. Underbrush around the camp buildings was cleared out. The Bradenton Rotary Club sponsored a picture and cleared about \$40.00 which was turned over to the Kiwanis Club to assist in their work at camp. The Sarasota Kiwanis Club built new latrine and washouse at Camp Gumpertz with FERA labor and re-roofed and screened the headquarters building. Also the grounds were cleaned up.

The Scout Executive was directed to write to the clubs expressing the thanks of the Executive Board.

The report of the Treasurer for the month of July was read and is filed herewith.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned after the rule adopted April 28th, 1928, had been read: "Eny member of the Executive Board who misses three or more consecutive meetings without reasonable and acceptable excuse will be automatically suspended."

To the Executive Board of Sunny Land Council.

Gentlemen:

I submit herewith my report on the summer camping activities of the council.

Early in the year, after conference with the officials of the Sarasota district, it was decided that it would best for the interests of all concerned if no attempt was made to conduct a regular council camping period at at Camp Gumpertz, but to hold the usual summer program at Camp Flying Eagle only, and to hold the arasota district camp site particularly for week-end and short term camps. Two reasons made this determination necessary: First, the necessity for extensive repairs and the lack of proper sanitation at Camp Gumpertz, and the additional expense involved in conducting two council camps.

This decision having been reached, the usual camp folder was mimeographed and placed in the hands of Scoutmasters, and preparations for open Camp Flying Eagle were initiated.

The week before camp was sceduled to open a committee from the Bradenton Kiwanis Club contacted the Scout Executive and as a result of the conference it was decided to tear down the old Court of Honor building in Bradenton and move the material to camp to complete to camp headquarters building and erect a first aid station. The Kiwanis club secured FERA labor and purchased siding and roofing for the first aid station, while the council bought roofing for the headquarters building. Other materials were contributed or were on hand at camp. The headquarters building was completed before the opening of the Scout camp, but the first aid station was not ready until just before the Kiwanis Health Camp opened. The Kiwanis aluh also worked over the bunks in the cabins and furnished 48 bed sacks.

The high water of last year having washed cabin No. 5 off its foundations, this was put in good shape and the screening on all the cabins either replaced or repaired by the Kiwanis Club with the help of FERA labor.

The junior staff moved out to camp three days before the opening and put things in good shape, doing a lot of cleanup work made necessary by unauthorized camping parties, and building a new dock and making other improvements on the water front. While the number of campers this year was somewhat larger than that of last year, it was still a great disappointment, 18 registering for the first week. It being manifestly impossible to conduct a camp without loss with such a few Scouts, it was immediately announced that there would be no second week unless at least 24 made application. The first week drawing to a close without this number being secured no effort was made to carry on the council program, and the camp was thrown open for troop camping. Two outfits checked in for the second week, Troop 9 of Manatee, with 7 members, and Troop 13 of Ellenton, with 9 members. Since no adult leaders appeared with these troops, the Scout Executive remained in camp. Troop 9, being an experienced camping unit, put on a very good program and remained for the entire week. Troop 13, a new outfit, and without suffacient experience in woodcraft and camping, remained only three days.

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Scouts who enjoyed the week of council camping were so enthusiastic that they thought they could get up a suffient number to make possible another period and on their lining up the required 24, camp was opened for another week. However, at the last minute 7 of the 24 failed to appear, and the last week was conducted with an even smaller number that the first period. However, while the first week showed a considerable financial loss, no additional deficit was incurred throught the second week's operation.

I am at a loss to know why so few Scouts attend the council camp. Those Scouts who do register return full of enthusiasm for the camp site and the program. It is not altogether a lack of finances that keeps the Scouts at home. There is something, it seems to me, which we have not been able to uncover, which is responsible for the poor attendance. Whether this is pure indifference on the part of the boys, lack of sufficient urging on the part of the Scoutmasters, or parental opposition I cannot say. I would recommend, however, that the Camping Committee make a careful study of the situation so that this may be remedied before the next camping season.

The program was not affected by the small number of campers. The usual waterfront activities and handicraft were put on. Camp details were light, food was plentiful and excellently prepared, and as a result the morale of the campers was unusually fine.

ADVANCEMENT

It has always been the policy at Flying Eagle to give ample epportunity for advancement, but not to insist upon it; the Scouts coming to camp for a good time rather than to pass tests. This year fair advancement was made in the Scouting tests but no records broken.

WATERFRONT

M. L. Rice was again in charge of waterfront activities. So far as can be determined unofficially all requirements for winning the Red Cross waterfront banner were met for the fourth consecutive year, 75% of the non-swimmers advancing to beginner; 56% of the beginners to swimmer, and the of the swimmers to Red Cross Life Savers.

FOOD

We were fortunate this year to secure as cook, W. L. James who proved to be a most excellent addition to the camp staff, serving meals promptly on time in a most attractive manner and with a minimum of waste. Since the cook undoubtedly makes or breaks the morale of a camp we were extremely lucky to have secured this man who made a great hit with the campers. Through the help of the camp staff he secured the same situation for the Kiwanis Health Camp and the 4*H girls camp.

SANITATION

With 13 years of experience in troop and council camps, I have not hestitancy in stating that Flying Eagle this year was the cleanest camp I have ever attended. Water was examined and found to be satisfactory, both for drinking and swimming. Garbage, thanks to the efforts of the sanitary squad, was burned promptly, and very few flies were to be seen.

The early start of the rainy season operated against the camp in bringing a pest of mosquitoes the first week, but for the remaining periods they were not troublesome.

NATURE STUDY

Campers this year adopted as a project the cutting of a trail through the hammock, to be known as the Dan Beard Nature Trail. Pioneers built a bridge over the ravine at one point and most of the work necessary to lay out the trail was done during the first and second council camping periods. It is hoped that the trail will be completed before the opeing of the camporee in Deccember and that it will be possible to have Uncle Dan officially dedicate it.

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While Mr. L. D. Roberts, handicraft director, was unable to be at camp during the whole of the period, he visited us at every opportunity and directed a very fine program. This year moccasins, knife sheaths, axe sheaths, canoes, arthery tackle, baskets and other projects were carried out very successfully.

TRIBE OF MANATEE

Two meetings of the Tribe of Manatee were held to initiate campers into this organization. Much work was done by members of the tribe at Amaca, their Indian village across the river.

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS

As usual the standard medical examinations were required from each camper. Dr. C. C. Montague visited the camp and made a thomough inspection on behalf of the committee on health and safety. No serious accidents occured, the first aid being limited to minor cuts and bruises, and no sickness was reported. Careful treatment of the ears and eyes of swimmers prevented the usual cases of infection, no sore eyes or ears developing in camp.

OFFICIAL VISITS

President Thorpe made several visits to camp and took an active part in the advancement program and other work about camp, as did Chairman Blakely of the Court of Honor,

W. W. Hubbell, chairman of the camping committee, made two visits, and W. D. Griffin and J. E. Cunningham, of the Executive Board, and District Commissioner Gautier Jackson were among the visitors.

The usual meeting of the Executive Committee at camp failed this year on account of a lack of quorum.

Herbert Stuckey, deputy regional executive, was present the first Saturday and made an official inspection, rating the camp as "excellent" on three items and "good" on seven others.

An official of the State Board of Health made an unannounced visit and found the camp in most excellent condition. COUNCIL FIRES, ETC.

Rain interfered with these on several occasions, but nearly every night some program was held. On Saturday of the last week, Mr. Williams of Sarasota spent the night and part of the next day with us and though his direction of singing contributed largely to the pep and morale of the closing sessions.

SUGGESTIONS FOR 1935 FINANCE DRIVE.

1. Put on mail campaign immediately. Send with letter of solicitation information on progress of Scouting in the area during 1934. Also financial report showing how funds have been expended.

Follow up first letter with another 15 days later.

Last year practically all funds from the Sarasota district, with the exception of the county's appropriation, were secured by mail.

After solicitation by campaign workers in Manatee county was over, a special mail campaign brought in \$142.00.

By raising as much as possible through a mail campaign the work of the general solicitors will be made easier.

- 2. Approach the county commissioners and find out how much can be counted on from this source.
- 3. About the middle of November put on the drive simultaneously in each district, after the usual preparation by newspaper and other publicity.

By completing the drive by the end of November we can go into the annual meeting and adopt a budget based on cash and pledges, instead of adopting the budget and then trying to raise it.

4. We have always had trouble getting enough workers who will actually work. This year we should get an early start in the selection of solicitors who will really put in time and effort.
