

Minutes for Executive Board

January 14, 1936

D. L. Thorpe, President, opened the meeting at 7:30 P. M.

Members of the Board present were: D. L. Thorpe, President, Paul W. Bergmann, George B. Gallup; Fred H. Gould, W. D. Griffin, George Blakely, Dr. H. J. Wendland, George L. King, George Hitchcock, Albert Yarn, A. H. Chapman, J. A. Gaskin.

The minutes of the last meeting, November 13, 1935, were read.

Mr. Paul W. Bergmann, First Vice-President, inducted Albert Yarn into office as Chairman of Leadership and Training.

Old business: Report from the Executive on the Camporee held at Tampa.

George King and George Hitchcock were appointed a committee to see G. F. Armstrong about the old Ford Truck.

A. H. Chapman was asked to make a financial report to the Board. In doing so he recommended that the Executive withdraw from the room.

The budget was placed at \$3640.00, with \$1000.00 more to be raised in Sarasota. The budget to run until November 1st. and at that time a new campaign be conducted for 1937.

Moved by George L. King, seconded by Paul Bergmann, and unanimously carried that present council car be donated to the Executive with the understanding that he furnish his own transportation beginning January 1st., 1936 and that an allowance not to exceed \$250.00 (payable in monthly installments) for balance of fiscal year, ending October 31, 1936, be authorized for travel expense and upkeep of car.

Moved by Paul Bergmann, seconded by George B. Gallup, and unanimously carried, that salary of executive be increased to \$150.00 per month, effective Jan. 1st, 1936.

The Executive was called back to the meeting and the above placed before him.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

Executive Board, Sunny Land Council

July 21, 1936

The meeting of the Executive Board, Sunny Land Council, was opened by President D. L. Thorpe, President. The roll was called and the following men were present: D. L. Thorpe, Paul W. Bergmann, George B. Gallup, Fred H. Gould, Lawson McGruder, Dr. H. J. Wendland, Doc. George White, J. A. Gaskin

The meetings of the previous meeting were read and approved.

D. L. Thorpe brought up a discussion upon the visit of Stanley A. Harris. Motion was made and carried to have as many members of the Board as possible attend the luncheon of the Optimist Club the following day in order to meet Mr. Harris.

Motion was made by Paul W. Bergmann to ask J. K. Singletary to become Chairman of Inter-Racial Committee. Seconded by D. D. Griffin.

Open discussion of Inter-Racial Scouting took place. Generally agreed upon, without formal presentation, to develop negro scouting.

The Executive was called upon to make a semi-annual report of council membership.

An open house discussion of Cubbing was entertained. Upon motion, Leo H. Wilson was suggested for Chairmanship. Committee appointed by Chair: Dr. Geo. White, Dr. Wendland, Geo. B. Gallup.

Mr. Geo. B. Gallup made a report upon the organization of Sea Scout Ship, and he is nominated and elected Commodore of the Local Sea Scout Program. - *Rollis*

J. A. Gaskin made a report on summer activities, including the summer camp.

Motion was carried to have the Executive write to Arthur A. Schuck, National Director of Operations, giving the Board's sincere hope of an early recovery from his operation.

The meeting was closed at 8:30.

Civic Service Committee

1. Promote some definite plans for troops to do at least one troop good every quarter. Get reports on same, and condense in committee's early report to the Executive Board.

2. Attend Scoutmaster and troop committee meetings and promote active and constant promotion of the daily good turn.

3. District wide community service, such as bundle day or old clothes once each year.

4. Arrange for Scout Service at Conventions, Fairs, Meetings, etc.

5. Committee to meet one to four times annually and report to the Executive Board quarterly.

6. Make up annual report on Civic service for the entire Council at end of same to be included in National report to Congress.

Inter-Racial Committee

1. Study needs of Negro boys, and problems of providing scouting.

2. Secure services of National Field Worker. Promote Training Courses.

3. Try to be trained before taking over troop.

4. Keep in touch with program of Troop.

5. Provide camping under strictest safety and health conditions.

6. Be careful about publicity.

7. Correlate Negro Program with Council activities.

8. Study and cultivate Negro institutional sponsors, and personnel.

9. Keep Executive Board posted with regular reports.

10. Committee meet one to four times annually and report to Executive Board quarterly.

Reading--Program

1. Study and promote the troop budget plan, as a means of putting Boy's in hands of Scouts. Attend Troop committee meetings and sell budget to them.

2. Arrange for public libraries in district to put in Scout department, reading supply of Merit Badge Pamphlets and Service Library.

3. Supply Troops with approved Scout book lists.

4. Help in supplying good reading material for Camp and Summer vacation.

5. Note a summer vacation reading program.

6. Encourage the passing of the reading Merit Badge.

7. Council with Boys about starting their own library, add books gradually.

8. Committee to meet four times annually and make regular reports to the Executive Board.

Educational Publicity Committee

1. Promote and contribute to a monthly (preferably weekly Council bulletin news letter, to all Scoutmaster, Troop Chairman and Executive Board.

2. Promote and participate in Council wide use of the printed page so as to public informed as to the needs and values of Scouting in the lives of boys.

3. Promote and conduct District and Council public events, such as Annual Scout week, Annual Troop Banquets with parents, Field Days, Rallies,

4. Committee to meet one to four times annually and report to the Ex. BOARD

Set up 10 year objectives for the registration of the 12 year olds and 4 year tenure through troops, districts, and entire Council.

Set machinery in motion to accomplish objectives, through surveys, reports, etc. The same to be done by troop leaders, district committees, Council Committees and production engineers.

Educate the Council membership in 10 year growth plan.

Make report of conditions and progress to Executive Board quarterly and meet one to four times annually.

District Commissioners

Assist the district Chairman and the Scout Executive in promoting all district activities and programs.

Serve as chairman of public events that involve scouts.

Promote 10 Year Growth program and leadership training.

Promote scouter registrations and full attendance upon district committee meetings.

Serve as general morale officer of district. Giving tactful and inspiring encouragement to Scoutmasters and other unit leaders.

Promote and supervise monthly unit rating plan. Report to Executive.

Conduct unit inspections at least quarterly. Report to Executive.

Promote and attend Scoutmasters round-table meetings.

Promote and secure leadership for field days, camporees, demonstrations, etc.

Promote and secure leadership for Field Days, Demonstrations, Patrol Camporees, etc.

Assist the Scout Executive in promoting all activities conducive to the unit growth and the Ten Year Program of growth.

Actively promote prompt re-registrations, camping, etc.

The District Commissioner is considered a voluntary assistant to the Scout Executive and is responsible directly to the Scout Executive for all duties.

Sea Scouting

Promote Sea Scout Patrols for all troops having enough Scouts who can qualify.

Promote Training courses for adult leaders and boy leaders.

Cultivate adequate institutional leadership, and promote it.

Arrange facilities for cruises under approved policies.

Make Sea Scouting a program of Scouting and not Seamanship.

Committee to meet one to four times annually and report to the Ex. BOARD

quarterly.

Training Committee

Camping Committee

Since the Scout Program is primarily by volunteer leaders, one of the biggest tasks ahead of us is to give this volunteer such training. The Boy Scout Program is an out of doors program. In several of our districts we do not get the Scout in the outdoors enough in our present plan administration. policy of this Committee to see that every volunteer in Scouting has some training each year. We adopt the training courses provided in the manual of the Boy Scouts of America.

Study and promote camping methods.

It shall always be the policy of this committee to see that there is always a safe and sane program of camping and hiking.

No hike or camp shall be conducted except where it meets the requirements of the Home Office on points of safety and sanitation.

Arrange for troops to be represented by leaders in Regional Camp Leader Schools. we adopt the slogan "Train before we try".

Make quarterly reports on camping to Executive Board.

Set up plans by March, including time, place, personnel, program, fees, etc of Summer Council Camps.

Visit summer camps.

Promote and conduct annual council and district and troop camporees.

Aid members of the Troop Committee in carrying out their responsibility to see that every boy in the troop has an opportunity to spend at least one week in the year in camp.

Aid the Troop Committee in seeing that frequent hikes and overnight camps be held. If we get the boys in Scouting in the out of doors, we will be better able to meet their needs and really acquaint them with the program of Scouting.

See that troops taking trips outside of the Council territory be given a permit from the home office. This application is secured through the Council office. This application must cover leadership, safety, health, and sanitation.

Encourage Scoutmasters to hold as many meetings as possible in the out of doors.

This committee to meet one to six times annually and to make quarterly reports to the Executive Board.

Court of Honor
Training Committee

Since the Scout Program is carried on primarily by volunteer leaders, one of the biggest tasks ahead of us is to give this volunteer such training as is necessary for the successful operation of Scouting in his field.

It shall be the policy of this Committee to see that every volunteer in Scouting has some training each year. We adopt the training courses provided and outlined by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

We recommend that this Council Committee go on record as favoring a course for troop committeemen and parents of Scouts as soon as is practicable.

We recommend that the Scoutmasters and Cubmasters lend themselves to their primary job of training their boy leaders to do a large share of the work connected with the program of Scouting and Cubbing.

We recommend that we adopt the slogan "Train before we try".

1. Set in motion machinery to fill these needs.
 - A. Schedule needed courses.
 - B. Organize faculty to give course.
2. Set objectives, etc.
3. Train Troop Committees so that they will better understand their work. This can be accomplished through frequent one night stands each year.
4. Train Merit Badge Counsellors and Court of Honor members, so that they will appreciate the important part they are playing in the development of the boy's character. This too, can be accomplished in one night meetings.
5. Offer to Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters such training periods as they may need to make their work more effective with boys.
6. Offer Cubmasters and Assistant Cubmasters necessary training as they may need to make their work more effective with boys from nine to twelve.
7. Promote and conduct training courses for the older boy, program, Sea Scouting, etc.
8. Supervise training for Negro Leadership.
9. Hold one to six meetings annually and make quarterly reports to Executive Board.

Court of Honor

Health and Safety Committee

The policy of this Committee shall be to see that all boys and men so understand the Scout Program that advancement will be natural and efficient.

1. Study needs of Troops and Scouts.
2. Study need for ceremonies, and public Court of Honor.
3. Set objectives for Council Advancement status, and promote Troop participation through Troop Committee and Scoutmaster.
4. Energize the entire Council with the results of the various District Courts of Honor in Area.
5. Minimum of one meeting annually.
6. Enlist, and train adequate men to serve as Merit Badge Councilors.
7. Accept the responsibility for regular Boards of Review, either as a general meeting or through Troop Committees as such.
8. Offer such suggestions to the Scout Leaders as will keep them and their Scouts progressing through the ranks of Scouting.
9. Supervise the selection of Scouts and Scouters for special recognitions.
10. Make the regular Court of Honor meetings and the awards such that the Public will attend and learn more about Scouting.
11. Make regular reports to Council Headquarters.
12. Adopt schedule of:
 - a. Require a health and safety report from the troop committee after each troop hike or camp.
 - b. Report Health and Safety conditions and program to the Executive Board quarterly.
 - c. Meet at least once a year.

Health and Safety Committee

Scouts carrying out the Scout Oath to keep themselves physically strong, and to give attention to their health factors.

It shall be the policy of this Committee to provide for Scouts healthful and safe conditions under which they can operate.

A group of people living under the motto "Be Prepared" should use every care for a safe operation of the Scout Program.

1. See that every meeting place is checked for hazards, especially fire hazards. Make an inspection of all troop meeting places and make necessary recommendations to the chairman of the Troop Committee.
2. See that every Scout is given a health check-up and in the future, require this statement for admission.
3. At the time of re-registration each year, make another check-up.
4. See that every troop is equipped with necessary First Aid equipment and see that they have sufficient knowledge to use it correctly.
5. Require Scoutmasters and Troop Committeemen to see that all vehicles used to transport Scouts have brakes in good condition and lights ready for use, and that said vehicles have a careful driver at the wheel.
6. Inspect camp sites, overnight camping places, etc. with special attention to the drinking water and disposal of waste materials.
7. Emphasize the need, in case of accidents, of summoning a physician so that he can make a diagnosis and thus minimize the danger of complications.
8. Require a health and safety report from the troop committee after each troop hike or camp.
9. Report Health and Safety conditions and Program to the Executive Board quarterly.
10. Meet one to four times annually.
11. Report to Executive Board quarterly. This committee should meet at least four times each year.

Rural Scouting Committee

Since a large number of boys live in rural territory and do not have the advantages of the city boys to enjoy Scouting, we shall try to take such steps as are needed to promote Scouting among these boys.

1. Study the farm boy population, conduct surveys, to know how many, who, and where they are.
2. Promote village and rural troops where institutional Leadership is available.
3. One member of this committee promote lone Scouting through rural Schools and other rural agencies, and a lone Scout Commissioner.
4. Secure and maintain active Scouting news in local and rural publications.
5. Educate farm parents in need of Scouting for their boys.
6. Cultivate schools and churches where troops or tribes might be organized.
7. Where there are places not having enough boys for troops or tribes set up home or associate patrols.
8. Encourage boys who cannot attend the above units to become members of the Lone Scout division.
9. Keep in touch with the Granges and Four H. work so that boys will be able to become members.
10. Keep in touch with these units and individuals by correspondence and keep their councilors appraised of the progress of the Scout work in the district.
11. Inform school teachers through county wide teachers meetings of the plan affording every boy a chance of becoming a Scout.
12. Try to increase the number of boys becoming Scouts in rural areas by personal contact whenever possible.
13. Report to Executive Board quarterly. This committee should meet at least four times each year.

Group Organization Committee

Cubbing Committee

You are to guide the District Committees in the matter of organization of Cub Scouts, Cub Scouts, Cub Scouts, and Cub Scouts.

It shall be the policy of this Committee to proceed soundly in the establishment of units for boys between the ages of nine and twelve.

It shall adopt fully the policies of the Home Office in not encroaching upon the Scout Program and keeping this activity primarily an activity of the home and neighborhood groups.

It is believed that it is necessary to require all Cubmasters to take some training before they begin their work with Cubs.

It is suggested that the leadership training committee be very careful in the selection of these men, as it is of such great importance that we have the right men at the head of these boys.

1. Cooperate with the Group organization Committee in cultivating institutions to administer Cubbing.
2. Organize thoroughly and guide consistently.
3. Talk with institutions and organizations about the adoption of the program and the organization of a Pack.
4. Assist Training Committee in conducting leadership courses in Cubbing.
5. See that the Cubbing Committeemen are men not already assigned a duty in the Scouting Program.
6. See that parents become interested and agree to give their active cooperation to the leaders and the work of Cubbing.
7. See that the Program is so operated that all of its members will graduate into Scouting.
8. See that the graduating ceremony pleases and impresses the Cub as well as the Scout.
9. See that the Cubmasters operate the Cub program and not the Scout Program.
10. Keep the membership of the Packs small at first, until the boys themselves understand the work of Cubbing.
 1. Do not proceed too rapidly.
 2. Do not use Scoutmasters and leaders.
 3. Report quarterly to the Executive Board and meet one to four times annually.
11. Promote troop re-registration by letter and contact.
12. Report condition and progress to Executive Board quarterly and hold meetings one to six each year.

Minimum of four meetings annually.

Report financial conditions to Executive Board quarterly.
