Membership -- 580

This is an increase of 80 Scouts over our last report of April. We took in 90 Scouts but lost through graduation or other reasons 10 Scouts.

Outline of talk at Sunny Land Council Meeting July 12th. by George Brewster Gallup, President.

ambers of the Council and especially our hosts of the Ft. Myers District:

This is the first time I've had the opportunity and pleasure of tending a scout meeting in Ft. Myers. This little city will always be sociated in my mind with the story of the most notable advances in sience. This of course is due to the long residence here during the inters of the late Thomas A. Edison. It must also be associated with is work to promote the careers of unusually talented youth.

As I read the forecast today of eminent scientists, economists, and especially those leaders of technical progress it seems inevitable that we should do our utmost in Scouting to prepare our youth of Scouting in this Region for success through practical instruction.

Any one who has paid attention to the addresses of college presilents and other distinguished speakers during the period of June commencements, not only of universities, technical institutions, but also high schools, must have been impressed that there are four or five million young people graduated this year and last who are looking for jobs.

Much advice has been given to these hopeful and ambitious young people but very little hopefulness with respect to their securing adequate employment. The fact is that so much of this advice seems to be of the nature of a tacit apology on the part of educators for their failure to equip adequately all these graduates for successful service in our kind of a society with its constant changes and diversified forms of technique.

It is evident that our job in Scouting is not to correct the dedelencies of our educational system, but it is also evident that we can
something toward discovering aptitudes of Scouts in their Troop
stivities and their merit badge tests, which will be in the nature of
cational decisions. By that I mean we can more generally attempt to
and out and stimulate the real inclinations and personal efficiency of
couts along practical lines.

We are just now at the early period of one of the most unusual itempts of any government to supply capital to millions of citizens for the building of suitable homes. It is recognized that there is a mortage in this country of several millions of homes. Hundreds of thousands of families are still compelled to live in shelters that are mworthy of civilized society.

My suggestion without further elaboration, is, that we should conider tonight what may be done through the help of Scoutmasters of all
the Troops in this region, to encourage the study of merit badge tests
rovided in our handbooks of such subjects as carpentry, plumbing,
lectricity, farm and home design, coment making, and all the other sublects pertaining to the manual efficiency in the building industry.

Some may think that this will mean opposition from organized labor. I do not think that in this section particularly, we need fear anything of this kind. What I do think is that we will discover that a very large proportion of our boys would take readily to these practical subjects. In many cases it might lead to uncovering such definite natural aptitudes that many Secuts in their school work would find a new interest in the scientific studies so abundantly offered them, especially in high school where they get at least some introduction into matters of smallation,

let, care of health, chemistry, and branches of manual training. Also, have in this region considerable provision for training in farmaing.

It cannot possibly be thought that we plan to train Scouts definitely for particular occupations but we could at least give many of them a start in the right direction.

with respect to housing, we can furnish all the scoutmasters with m abundance of simple circulars and manuals that will enable them to discuss with the members of their Troops, certain factors of good housing and the manner in which citizens everywhere of a frugal and thrifty therefore with small savings can secure homes for themselves on long terms of payment and at a low rate of interest that are up to a proper standard for American living.

There is certainly great need all through this region for new homes for growing families with young children some of whom are of Scout age.

I wish to propose that here in Ft. Myers, tonight, in the home made famous by one of the greatest scientists the world has ever known, that we undertake new and definite leadership, somehow and in some measure along the lines that I have ventured to indicate.

So far as I am concerned this question is an economic and social question.

It is in no sense, in my advocacy a political question having partisen implications.

The problem of decent housing roots itself in the very soil of democracy. A great impetus in home building is reflected in work activity throughout the nation.

In Florida particularly, modern homes even inexpensive ones, costing \$2000.00 and upward, can have the most modern equipment devised by

lence, including provision for the most advanced form of technilogical vention, air conditioning.

I should like, if it meets with your approval, to discuss the masibility of having a special committee appointed by the chairman of such District to consider this proposal and if possible make it effective their effort to introduce some new steps toward the realization of his program through our Sunny Land Council.

The Board, upon motion and duly seconded, voted to hold the Annual Dinner Meeting in Sarasota on Thursday night December 8th, and that the committee appointed by Sarasota District arrange the program and accommodations. This committee consists of Frank Stewart, Chairman, and Executive.

An application by Scouters of Myakka City for approximately \$70.00 from 1939 Budget to be used in finishing Troop hut was read to the Board by the Executive.

After discussion, motion made by D. L. Thorpe, Seconded by Dr. H. J. Wendland, was passed to table the application as there has been no precedent for making appropriations for individual Troops.

The meeting adjourned at 8:30.
