

## CRAFTWORK

At Flying Eagle Scouts will have opportunity to work on various handicraft projects. It is planned this year to improvise troop and patrol equipment, such as haversacks, pack carriers, pack baskets, water bags and other articles that will be needed on the overnight hikes which each patrol will take during the camp period. In addition to this, campers may work on archery tackle, leathercraft and other kinds of Scoutcraft. As usual, Field Commissioner "Pop" Roberts will be in charge of this part of the camp program.

## CAMPOREE STUFF

The usual overnight hike program will be extended this year so as to provide for each camp patrol to spend at least one day and one night in camping organized along camporee lines. This plan has proved very successful in Sunny Land Council. It is the most efficient way of teaching the Scouts to take care of themselves when out on their own. ## A WORD TO PARENTS

We take pleasure in announcing the fourth camping season at Flying Eagle. The record of the three previous years is one of which we are justly proud and we shall endeavor from year to year to improve on that record in an effort to make Camp Flying Eagle the best of Scout camps.

Our aim is to put on programs that will appeal to the boys; that will give them the life of adventure which they crave, and at the same time assure the parents that the health, safety and morals of their boys are being guarded in the most efficient manner.

Upon the good will of the parents depends the success of our camping periods. We want you to feel that camping, as carried out at Flying Eagle, is necessary to the welfare of your boys.

It costs little more to send a boy to Camp Flying Eagle than it costs to feed him at home. If you feel that this year you cannot afford even this small fee, urge your son to get some job at which he can work after school and on Saturdays and so earn his money. This, after all, is the ideal way to send a boy to camp. The Scoutmaster of the troop in which he is enrolled, the members of the Troop Committee and the officials of Sunny Land Council will all cooperate in helping to find work for him. We are issuing this camp bulletin earlier than usual this year in order that those boys who must earn their camp fees can start out now looking for jobs.

It is hardly necessary for us to tell the parents of our Scouts about Camp Flying Eagle. Most of the fathers and mothers who have boys in Scouting have visited camp during the season and have seen the activities carried on there. They know the efficiency with which the camp staff works; they have seen how carefully swimming and boating are supervised; how the health of the Scouts is guarded; how the food is prepared and served; the type of program put on. It is possible, however, that you do not know how badly your son would feel if he should miss the camp period.

We want every Scout in Sunny Land Council at Flying Eagle this year. Help us to reach this goal by helping your son to be with us.

## WHO MAY GO TO CAMP?

Any registered Scout who is in good standing with his troop may register for Camp Flying Eagle.

## WHAT WILL IT COST?

The camp fee is \$6.00 per week for Scouts in Sunny Land Council. For Scouts in other councils a slightly higher rate will be charged. One dollar of the fee must be sent in with the application and balance paid on reaching camp. Scouts registering for more than one week may pay weekly.

Those Scouts desiring to make archery tackle or to do leathercraft while in camp should so state in their applications in order that materials may be ordered. The cost of archery materials is \$3.00. Leathercraft materials vary in cost according to the project. Such materials cannot be ordered after June 10.

## MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS

In order to protect the health of campers, all applications of both Scouts and Scouters must be accompanied by the standard medical examination blank, properly filled out. These blanks will be furnished on request.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

The camp is governed by the Scout Laws. The Traditions of Camp Flying Eagle, based upon these laws, will be observed by all good campers.

## SLEEPING QUARTERS

Scouts are quartered in cabins with accommodations for eight boys. A member of the junior staff will be in charge of each cabin. Whenever possible, Scouts from the same troop and patrol will be billeted together. The hut leader is responsible for discipline and for the cleanliness of the cabin and surrounding grounds. His orders have the same authority as those of the senior staff.

## WATERFRONT ACTIVITIES

Last year Camp Flying Eagle was one of two Scout camps in the Sixth Region winning the Red Cross Banner for waterfront proficiency. M. L. Rice, who has been director of this department for the last two years with great success, will again be in charge. He will be assisted by a detail of Scout Life Guards. In addition to the usual swimming program this year, it is planned to put on a course in boating, in order to give every camper practical instruction along this line.
